Aitanna: I urge very strongly to motion suspend the bylaws for today regarding approving funding for a conference. This is for the Lesbians Who Tech Conference. It's happening February 28th through March 2nd. I need the funding as soon as possible. What it's looking like with my SOAR advisor is that I won't be getting the money until the day before the conference. That is why I am asking now.

Citlalli: So last week we passed the Title IX resolution and the Title IX office sent a response: "Thank you for you and SUA for your work on this issue. We appreciate the space you have created to talk about how we plan to come in to federal compliance in a manner consistent with our values as an institution and our commitment to ensuring an educational space that is free of sex based harassment and discrimination. I will work on getting you a statement by this coming Monday, February 11, 2019...Again, thank you for holding space for this issue and inviting us into this conversation. As an institution and our commitment to ensuring that so we should have a full statement by next meeting." I also want to say that in the

next day or two, my two intern positions should be live on the website. One will be housing organizer. The other will be focused on securing general resources for the livelihood of the student body. If you're interested in community organizing and passionate about housing rights that's what I'll be doing.

Zach: I'm changing my office hours on Tuesdays from 5-7 on Tuesdays from 4-6 pm.

We do have an SUA slack, it's just a matter of me emailing it out because I'm drafting an email. That should be sent out hopefully tonight. No later than midday tomorrow. Thanks for y'all's patience on that. We have some snacks in the back.

Jessica: Hello everyone, I'm on the zero waste team. In the upcoming quarter we will be planning a Zero Waste event. It doesn't focus on people of color or poor people at all that haven't been practicing a lot of these new trends. This is to promote an inclusive and easy access. Finally, what we are doing is creating a planning committee to invite two, queer, brown amazing zero waste couple from Oakland to come and do a panel. We are thinking an open-mic night or something, followed by a dinner. So if you are interested in collaborating and funding and being on the committee let me know. Thank you!

Zach: There have been concerns about the added workload onto the SUA recording clerk. If y'all want to talk about this I'd be happy to talk about that with y'all as well. Basically, there's been times where the recording clerk is taking minutes beyond just the SUA meetings. We can take some action on this if y'all are interested in this.

Owen: I think just the recording clerks duties changed when they got the position there was an increase their workload [?].

Zach: Additionally, never mind.

Ayo: Hey y'all so as I talked about earlier, next week i'm going to be starting the presidential summit leadership program. We want to assemble as many presidents from the CSU's and UC's, and community colleges for the higher education voice. We could assemble all of those voices and establish a California state wide student government to have a more closer relationship with California legislators. Stephen: Motion to amend that agenda such that the presentation by Aitanna for the Lesbians who Tech conference is moved to now and the remainder of agenda is [?] immediately afterwards 8:42 pm.

David: Second 8:42 pm.

Zach: Are there any objections? That being said I am now taking stack for that (Motion passed) 8:42 pm.

-Funding Request: Lesbians Who Tech Conference 8:43 pm

Zach: You can see the presentation in the SOFA minutes. On the agenda is how much we were planning on allocating. I can give y'all a little bit of time to look at that stuff.

Cameron: Is there a spreadsheet for all the recommendations?

Zach: It's next to the agenda. What was that? How much are they requesting? \$700.

Owen: Can I make a motion to fully fund out of the SUA general budget.

Zach: You can, but in order to do that we need to suspend the bylaws.

Emma: Motion to suspend the bylaws 8:45 pm

When we go into SOFA I don't think we're going to go line by line because that defeats the purpose of having SOFA separate from SUA. When I was in SOFA thinking about this, basically this is an important conference. The person is going to be able to come back to their org on campus and present the information.

David: Motion to extend by three minutes 8:50 pm.

Venkatesh: So when we were discussing this at SOFA. My understanding is that the person who is going to this event will come back and plan an event to present this information to the general student body. I was just wondering what the logistics of this workshop would be and if it's confirmed?

Aitanna: I'm on the committee for Blackout. We are expecting about 150 attendees. That will also be fun and I can facilitate with them and tell them how amazing this conference is. There are a lot of queer engineers, we're just not together or have a community. Another plan is to go to their orgs and make a presentation.

Zolt: So you're talking about organizing different groups on campus, but I don't see how this presentation [?]? Secondly, will this event be live-streamed in anyway?

Aitanna: Yes it will be live-streamed. Also if you want to check the statement there is a link on their website. Organizing on campus —I've been involved in every black org there is on campus. I also work in Basking Engineering. So organizing is not a problem for me.

Zolt: The question is how is this going to help you organize. Secondly, if the event is live-streamed, then besides personal networking I don't see how it would benefit queer engineer groups on campus.

Aitanna: Right, so there is no queer engineer groups on campus. The difference is that there is a career fair[?]. It's important that I show up and show face rather than from a screen.

Tommy: I don't know what's going on in this space. I know we're talking about how much it's changing and how we want to fight for our students. I know that this is for one person, but you have to think about the lack of black queer people on this campus. It's a great experience and I don't know why people are hesitating. We send people everywhere. Why can't we spend money to help someone educate others?

-Basic Life Support/Bleeding Control for UCSC Students (10 minutes)907 Alexandra[?] : I did this presentation last spring. We're a pre-hospital care center student organization. We are dedicated to creating a safe [?]community providing mentorship and support for students who are interested to get students CPR certified.We're also dedicated to bringing awareness to campus wide emergencies and providing students with training to respond to those emergencies. The cost of this training is \$85 per students. \$6,800 for 80 students. So what is basic life support? It is an American Heart Association that trains students to respond to several life threatening emergencies. The first of this is cardiovascular emergencies which is done through high quality CPR and these skills learned are applicable to infants, children, and adults. This course also focuses on team dynamics. Bleeding control trains participants to stop life-threatening bleeding.This type of training is extremely important on our campus specifically. As you all know we are very isolated from the general community. This widely effects the type of emergency response we get from paramedics. In an urban area the ambulance has to make it there in 8 minutes or less. If it's considered a suburban area 12 minutes or less. Parts of our campus are urban and/or suburban. That widely changes how long they have to get there. When you're thinking about how long someone can survive without oxygen that's about 4-6 minutes.

Zolt: with these trainings are you providing the trainings with a way to respond. Or just increasing the probability that they will be there, which I think is good.

Zach: Can we take questions after?

Alexandra: I would like to do both. My goal is to certify majority of students at UCSC, but we need funding to make that happen because these trainings are extremely expensive. We are trying to increase the number of students that can respond to these situations and confidently respond to them. Some facts of AHA is that immediate initiation of CPR can double chances of survival. CPR is not for just heart attack victims. We have a ton of incidents that can happen: electric shock, overdose, choking. Bleeding control: it takes five minutes or less for a person to die from significant blood loss. Studies have found that after these mass casualty shooting incidents...majority of these fatalities caused by these incidents would have been affectively obliterated. So no one should be dying from blood loss if this is appropriately responded to.

Community members that can confidently and effectively respond to these. We want to make UCSC students and the community more comfortable knowing that there are students that can respond. No other UCs have done this and we want to be the first to do this and take initiative. The training structure: it's a two hour. The one class holds forty students, one will be held on Saturday and the next on Sunday. We have lunch provided by [?]. Funding is super important for this project. This project needs longterm funding to sustain this. I've asked the FAFC to fund \$2000 to fund quarterly for four years. That'd be 200 students a quarter. This funding I won't here back until spring quarter. That's why I'm here asking tonight. I also submitted to CORE council for the exact same amount. Pass training: I certified 300 students and 100 were certified through funding from SUA last year.

Enrique: Motion to extend time by five minutes 9:16.

Venkatesh: Second 9:16 pm.

Venkatesh: From my understanding it's \$6,800 for each quarter and you want us to fund for 12 quarters?

Alexandra[?]: That's correct.

Enrique: Can you repeat that?

Alexandra: The application I submitted for them is a little different I asked for 200 students a quarter instead of 80.

Enrique: I was going to ask if there is a package or deal?

Alexandra: \$85 is the deal. They were giving it to us for \$55 which is cheaper but these trainings are expensive. We have to pay for the instructors, for the equipment —which is really expensive.

Enrique: Cool, and have you reached out to other colleges?

Alexandra: I have and I haven't. At the beginning of last year I did and we got turned down because they didn't see how the training would impact the students at the specific colleges. I wanted to go after larger sources of funding. That's why I presented to SOFA and SUA.

David: What's the difference between a paramedic and BLS ambulance?

Alexandra: A BLS ambulance is basic life support which is the minimum amount of support to keep someone alive. I'm an EMT certified. My scope is much smaller than what a paramedic can provide. Their care is a lot more advanced and they can do a lot more the EMTs can't. In these life-threatening situations, the discrepancy of an EMT and paramedic what they can do is very minimal

David: Why isn't the firehouse sufficient?

Alexandra: The UCPD are all CPR certified, but they're not on at the same time and not always here on campus and they aren't always here. It's the County fire department. We're what 22,000 students so those ten people that might be on a given day...

David: Have you thought about organizing that group of people after they take the class so if there's an emergency?

Alexandra: That is a good recommendation and something I will take into consideration.

Stephen: I wanted to use that last question to also pitch in an app if you are CPR certified an app will ping you if someone is in need for Cpr or [?] response. There's a map and that's all through emergency services and the fire department.

Zach: We are out of time. Is there any motions to extend time?

Enrique: Motion to extend time by two minutes 9:21 pm.

Venkatesh: Second 9:21 pm.

Zolt: Have you considered talking to [?] at all? They're facilitated at OPERS and they also host classes this would be a great pitch to them. I'm sure that they would host classes and you could reach a large student body and have long-term funding.

Alexandra: I have not because they offer their own trainings and are more expensive then what we're offering.

Enrique: Who are the students you're hoping to train?

Alexandra: We're working with Sigma [?] and Kappa [?] and we're hoping to reach as many students as possible. I would specifically like to get to underrepresented students. Students who are unable to pay for this training otherwise. I don't want to limit to anyone though. I think the more people that are trained is better.

Enrique: Does it need to be certified? I feel like if that'd be an option

Alexandra[?]: We've done tabling with CPR in the past, but not a lot of people want to do that. A lot of people also need the certification for jobs. This training is really important for muscle memory. So when you need to perform CPR, you're not trying to recall what to do, it's just kind of a basic instinct. The time allotted for these trainings is really beneficial.

Cameron: Motion to extend time by five minutes 9:26 pm

Zach: Motion to extend time by five minutes made by Cameron.

-West Fest (10 minutes)9:27 pm

I'm the current Oakes senate treasurer, my name is Angie. I'm here representing for the West Fest Committee. To ask for funding for our annual west fest happening on February 23rd on a Sunday from from 1-4 pm. It will be located near the Rachel Carson dining hall. We are currently asking for at least \$1,000 for funding. We have presented to most of the colleges and I have only one senate meeting left to go to. Right now we have currently made up enough to cover our currently reduced budget. As you can see that's how much we have so far. There's also a list of all the items we plan to purchase and rent. We had to take in mind the amount of waste we are generating. We have noticed that catering takes up a lot of our budget. We are reaching out to performers on campus so that we could include a lot more talent this year. Last year we primarily let KZSC to [?] and they weren't satisfied with the selection. A lot of us felt that there should be more diversity in performers. We are also reaching out to a lot of orgs to come table at this event. We are making this an event available for everybody. We also have to recognize that a lot of those events aren't accessible to students —especially those living on the West Side. So I'm here requesting \$1,000 for the event.

Venkatesh: So if I'm hearing correct. You are fully funded but you want more funding to extend the funding? because

Angie: That's correct. The original budget was a lot larger.

David: What were the financial issues you mentioned?

Angie: We've reached out to a lot of colleges. We were reliant on SFAC to help us fund, but unfortunately they won't be able to review our fund request until spring. We are fully funded for this year. It's a really really tight budget. If we get more funding we'll put that into budget line items that we have that we feel deserve more funding.

David: So if we fund you more you'll have [?] to use that one?

Angie: Yes.

Zolt: I'm on the West Fest committee. We are dramatically underfunded from previous years and we are basically at minimum funding. With more money we'll be able to provide students funding with more food access. We want to be able to cater to more cultures and represent them. Lays chips and cotton candy doesn't suffice. As far as I know we're going to have to [?]. We won't be able to put in the money to advertise. It's going to be hard to publicize this event because of the lack of funding from previous years.

Cameron: How much underfunded are y'all?

Angie: Overall, Oakes and Rachel Carson have contributed the most. Each contributed \$750. From the rest of the colleges I believe it's \$500.

Cameron: Y'all said last year you had more money. What's the discrepancy right now?

Angie: [inaudible].

Zach: Thank you very much for presenting. Next we have SOFA. We have two more presenters, does anyone want to make a motion?

Stephen: Didn't the previous motion move all presentations to the current business?

Zach: We have SOFA as a presentation next.

Emma: Personal information: Why is SOFA before a presentation in the first place?

Zach: I had put it there because third world liberation had wanted to come a little bit later. Also some SOFA reps wanted to leave before, but now they're an alternate.

-Student Organization Funding Advisory (SOFA) Committee

Recommendations (20 minutes)

-Third World Liberation Front CRES Event (10 minutes) 9:39pm

Zolt: I just wanted to point out that third world isn't a term that we should be using and third world is problematic [?].

Rep: We can explain the significance of third world and why it is used.

I'm Michaela they/them. I'm Marianna. We comprise of some of the undergraduate staff that work for the CRES department. It's under the humanities and a new major on campus. We are trying to push our involvement in the community and in order to do that we need to ask for funding. This quarter it's the third world liberation front was a student organization to demand for ethnic studies to be taught in a third world rubric. That's where the term comes from students like Asian American activists and black student activists. A term that came out of students who organized and wanted their curriculum to reflect themselves. It's called all power to the people. We'll be inviting three guests. It's going to be a two-two-part event February 21st and 22nd. We'll have other student representatives who will ask them questions. The second part is going to be Friday morning in a more intimate space where readings and other materials given by the guests will be suggested to us so that we can discuss with each other. The purpose of the event is to focus on the Asian American activism. Those are sort of like the bodies that are working in conjunction with CRES department on this event. The three people we invited are three asian American activists from the bay area. Our current budget is \$5,072 and we are currently funded \$3,350. If you look at the sheets you can see who are those bodies. The Dean of student affairs, education department, humanities, diversity inclusion, etc. We are asking for \$1,522. Most of this money is going to go towards the honorariums for the guests as a sign of respect. This money will go towards honorariums so we can always mail to them after. I want to reiterate the fact that this is new and it's hard for us to get funding. We also have on the sheets, groups that we've asked money from, but haven't been confirmed. -Basic Life Support/Bleeding Control for UCSC Students (10 minutes)907 Alexandra[?] : I did this presentation last spring. We're a pre-hospital care center student organization. We are dedicated to creating a safe [?]community providing mentorship and support for students who are interested to get students CPR certified. We're also dedicated to bringing awareness to campus wide emergencies and providing students with training to respond to those emergencies. The cost of this training is \$85 per students. \$6,800 for 80 students. So what is basic life support? It is an American Heart Association that trains students to respond to several life threatening emergencies. The first of this is cardiovascular emergencies which is done through high quality CPR and these skills learned are applicable to infants, children, and adults. This course also focuses on team dynamics. Bleeding control trains participants to stop life-threatening bleeding. This type of training is extremely important on our campus specifically. As you all know we are very isolated from the general community. This widely effects the type of emergency response we get from paramedics. In an urban area the ambulance has to make it there in 8 minutes or less. If it's considered a suburban area 12 minutes or less. Parts of our campus are urban and/or suburban. That widely changes how long they have to get there. When you're thinking about how long someone can survive without oxygen that's about 4-6 minutes.

Zolt: with these trainings are you providing the trainings with a way to respond. Or just increasing the probability that they will be there, which I think is good.

Zach: Can we take questions after?

Alexandra: I would like to do both. My goal is to certify majority of students at UCSC, but we need funding to make that happen because these trainings are extremely expensive. We are trying to increase the number of students that can respond to these situations and confidently respond to them. Some facts of AHA is that immediate initiation of CPR can double chances of survival. CPR is not for just heart attack victims. We have a ton of incidents that can happen: electric shock, overdose, choking. Bleeding control: it takes five minutes or less for a person to die from significant blood loss. Studies have found that after these mass casualty shooting incidents...majority of these fatalities caused by these incidents would have been affectively obliterated. So no one should be dying from blood loss if this is appropriately responded to.

Community members that can confidently and effectively respond to these. We want to make UCSC students and the community more comfortable knowing that there are students that can respond. No other UCs have done this and we want to be the first to do this and take initiative. The training structure: it's a two hour. The one class holds forty students, one will be held on Saturday and the next on Sunday. We have lunch provided by [?]. Funding is super important for this project. This project needs longterm funding to sustain this. I've asked the FAFC to fund \$2000 to fund quarterly for four years. That'd be 200 students a quarter. This funding I won't here back until spring quarter. That's why I'm here asking tonight. I also submitted to CORE council for the exact same amount. Pass training: I certified 300 students and 100 were certified through funding from SUA last year.

Enrique: Motion to extend time by five minutes 9:16.

Venkatesh: Second 9:16 pm.

Venkatesh: From my understanding it's \$6,800 for each quarter and you want us to fund for 12 quarters?

Alexandra[?]: That's correct.

Enrique: Can you repeat that?

Alexandra: The application I submitted for them is a little different I asked for 200 students a quarter instead of 80.

Enrique: I was going to ask if there is a package or deal?

Alexandra: \$85 is the deal. They were giving it to us for \$55 which is cheaper but these trainings are expensive. We have to pay for the instructors, for the equipment —which is really expensive.

Enrique: Cool, and have you reached out to other colleges?

Alexandra: I have and I haven't. At the beginning of last year I did and we got turned down because they didn't see how the training would impact the students at the specific colleges. I wanted to go after larges sources of funding. That's why I presented to SOFA and SUA.

David: What's the difference between a paramedic and BLS ambulance?

Alexandra: A BLS ambulance is basic life support which is the minimum amount of support to keep someone alive. I'm an EMT certified. My scope is much smaller than what a paramedic can provide. Their care is a lot more advanced and they can do a lot more the EMTs can't. In these life-threatening situations, the discrepancy of an EMT and paramedic what they can do is very minimal

David: Why isn't the firehouse sufficient?

Alexandra; The UCPD are all CPR certified, but they're not on at the same time and not always here on campus and they aren't always here. It's the County fire department. We're what 22,000 students so those ten people that might be on a given day...

David: Have you thought about organizing that group of people after they take the class so if there's an emergency?

Alexandra: That is a good recommendation and something I will take into consideration.

Stephen: I wanted to use that last question to also pitch in an app if you are CPR certified an app will ping you if someone is in need for Cpr or [?] response. There's a map and that's all through emergency services and the fire department.

Zach: We are out of time. Is there any motions to extend time?

Enrique: Motion to extend time by two minutes 9:21 pm.

Venkatesh: Second 9:21 pm.

Zolt: Have you considered talking to [?] at all? They're facilitated at OPERS and they also host classes this would be a great pitch to them. I'm sure that they would host classes and you could reach a large student body and have long-term funding.

Alexandra: I have not because they offer their own trainings and are more expensive then what we're offering.

Enrique: Who are the students you're hoping to train?

Alexandra: We're working with Sigma [?] and Kappa [?] and we're hoping to reach as many students as possible. I would specifically like to get to underrepresented students. Students who are unable to pay for this training otherwise. I don't want to limit to anyone though. I think the more people that are trained is better.

Enrique: Does it need to be certified? I feel like if that'd be an option

Alexandra[?]: We've done tabling with CPR in the past, but not a lot of people want to do that. A lot of people also need the certification for jobs. This training is really important for muscle memory. So when you need to perform CPR, you're not trying to recall what to do, it's just kind of a basic instinct. The time allotted for these trainings is really beneficial.

I'm the current Oakes senate treasurer, my name is Angie. I'm here representing for the West Fest Committee. To ask for funding for our annual west fest happening on February 23rd on a Sunday from from 1-4 pm. It will be located near the Rachel Carson dining hall. We are currently asking for at least \$1,000 for funding. We have presented to most of the colleges and I have only one senate meeting left to go to. Right now we have currently made up enough to cover our currently reduced budget. As you can see that's how much we have so far. There's also a list of all the items we plan to purchase and rent. We had to take in mind the amount of waste we are generating. We have noticed that catering takes up a lot of our budget. We are reaching out to performers on campus so that we could include a lot more talent this year. Last year we primarily let KZSC to [?] and they weren't satisfied with the selection. A lot of us felt that there should be more diversity in performers. We are also reaching out to a lot of orgs to come table at this event. We are making this an event available for everybody. We also have to recognize that a lot of those events aren't accessible to students —especially those living on the West Side. So I'm here requesting \$1,000 for the event.

Venkatesh: So if I'm hearing correct. You are fully funded but you want more funding to extend the funding? because

Angie: That's correct. The original budget was a lot larger.

David: What were the financial issues you mentioned?

Angie: We've reached out to a lot of colleges. We were reliant on SFAC to help us fund, but unfortunately they won't be able to review our fund request until spring. We are fully funded for this year. It's a really really tight budget. If we get more funding we'll put that into budget line items that we have that we feel deserve more funding.

David: So if we fund you more you'll have [?] to use that one?

Angie: Yes.

Zolt: I'm on the West Fest committee. We are dramatically underfunded from previous years and we are basically at minimum funding. With more money we'll be able to provide students funding with more food access. We want to be able to cater to more cultures and represent them. Lays chips and cotton candy doesn't suffice. As far as I know we're going to have to [?]. We won't be able to put in the money to advertise. It's going to be hard to publicize this event because of the lack of funding from previous years.

Cameron: How much underfunded are y'all?

Angie: Overall, Oakes and Rachel Carson have contributed the most. Each contributed \$750. From the rest of the colleges I believe it's \$500.

Cameron: Y'all said last year you had more money. What's the discrepancy right now?

Zolt: I just wanted to point out that third world isn't a term that we should be using and third world is problematic [?].

Rep: We can explain the significance of third world and why it is used.

I'm Michaela they/them. I'm Marianna. We comprise of some of the undergraduate staff that work for the CRES department. It's under the humanities and a new major on campus. We are trying to push our involvement in the community and in order to do that we need to ask for funding. This quarter it's the third world liberation front was a student organization to demand for ethnic studies to be taught in a third world rubric. That's where the term comes from students like Asian American activists and black student activists. A term that came out of students who organized and wanted their curriculum to reflect themselves. It's called all power to the people. We'll be inviting three guests. It's going to be a two-two-part event February 21st and 22nd. We'll have other student representatives who will ask them questions. The second part is going to be Friday morning in a more intimate space where readings and other materials given by the guests will be suggested to us so that we can discuss with each other. The purpose of the event is to focus on the Asian American activism. Those are sort of like the bodies that are working in conjunction with CRES department on this event. The three people we invited are three Asian American activists from the bay area. Our current budget is \$5,072 and we are currently funded \$3,350. If you look at the sheets you can see who are those bodies. The Dean of student affairs, education department, humanities, diversity inclusion, etc. We are asking for \$1,522. Most of this money is going to go towards the honorariums for the guests as a sign of respect. This money will go towards honorariums so we can always mail to them after. I want to reiterate the fact that this is new and it's hard for us to get funding. We also have on the sheets, groups that we've asked money from, but haven't been confirmed. As soon as possible would be great. Any questions? comments/concerns? Aspirations?

Enrique: Have y'all reached out to other colleges?

Michaela: We've reached out to Nine and Merrill. [Nine] They could only offer us physical space but it was booked at the time we needed it. We're asking from social justice related ones. It's hard because it's the CRES department. It's also like a reason because it's the department asking for money not a student org.

Enrique: [I couldn't hear but he mentioned Jay Padgett].

Michaela: We've gotten "eh" response that said we can provide funding, but it would be funding given after the event.

Enrique: If y'all want [?] we can offer that.

Michaela: Thank you. We'd also appreciate advertising the event.

Natasha: I just have a clarification question: is it Asian American or is it just Filipinx?

Michaela: It's going to be two Filipina women and Chinese activists. We did want to have a focus on Filipinx because it originally came from their dialogue. That's why there's a concentrate for that. We also didn't want a man; that stereotypical role.

Enrique: The \$1,000 that goes towards the police is that for security?

ISA: It's for the student ambassadors they contact them if anything goes wrong.

Enrique: Have there been any issues in the past?

ISA: Yes actually there were two arrests last year. There have been a couple arrests in the past years because people have been under the influence at the event which is not appropriate. We do advertise that you cannot be under the influence at the event.

ISA: It's for the sound equipment to stay away from the outside we are not allowed to be around. Besides that, that's pretty much what they're there for. It's surrounding the students to keep them away from the stage. It is a stipulation from OPERS.

They have a debate. They win awards for the school. Slug Anime [?] Association, we fully funded 500 dollars. They're trying to do an event with lots of attendance --200 people. Fish Rep [?] \$650 for their newspapers. KASA asked for \$1000 for a social. We funded them \$870 for tech crew and dining hall. Colleges against cancer was asking for \$2000 for relay for life. We funded them \$450 and we covered just food.

Aitanna, Lesbians Who Tech--that was taken care of. ISA \$4000...let me get back to that. Rocket Team at UCSC asked for \$1,000 and we funded them \$150 because usually a lot of the STEM programs have a lot more access to grants. This is the number three research institution in the world so they have more access for funding. Student academic senate we decided not to fund mainly because of access. Mecha asked for \$2,016.78 we funded them fully.

Citlalli: It was a program were they went to Davenport to work with youth.

Ayo: UCSC Food System Working Group asked for \$2,000.

Sofa rep: Around 500 people would be attending (on and off campus people).

Ayo: The College Diabetes network. This is one that I really want SUA to look at more closely because they're doing great stuff. They're putting sugar boxes around campus for people who have low blood sugar. I think we should figure out a way to permanently fund them. Slugbotics asked for 42,500. What was that for?

Citlalli: For some underwater robotic I think for a competition?

Ayo: We funded them \$550 for printing and registration. Scientific Slug is a magazine. They asked for \$1,600 we funded \$500. Students for Sensible Drug Policy asked for \$1,200 and they were fully funded. What was that again?

Citlalli: Harm reduction. They go give out [?].

Ayo: Association for Computing Machinery asked for \$4,000, we funded them \$1,700.

Citlalli: It was a mini-hackathon kind of like a smaller version of Cruz-Hacks.

Ayo: Oxfam Club at UCSC asked for \$500 and we fully funded them.

Zach: It was an art show about refugees in Oregon.

Ayo: I mixed that with Red Wheelbarrow as well got fully funded \$300. Friends of the Community Agroecology Network, we decided not to fund. Does anyone want to speak on that? Natasha?

Natasha: Oh thank you! I wasn't even raising my hand. It's because they weren't affecting enough UCSC students.

Ayo: ISA came and asked for \$4,000. We decided to fund them an extra \$1000. Student Parent Organization they're having a study session with the daycare and they asked for \$1,646. We funded them \$1,200. Active Minds at UCSC, we decided not to fund because we thought that was a lot of money for backpacks. Vietnamese Student Association asked for \$975 for their charity fundraiser.

Joshua: [?]. They also fundraised and that's why we decided to fully fund them.

Ayo: National Society of Black Engineers conference to take Black Engineers to Chicago and meet face-to-face with multiple networks across google and other. We fully funded them \$4,000 because it was a big impact and good number of students.

Natasha: Out of the 30 students they're taking, over half are women.

Venkatesh: I just want to say that's really high for an engineering club, that's an achievement.

Ayo: We have Engineers Without Borders that asked for \$4,000.

Citlalli: They're going to help put solar panels on new houses that are built.

Ayo: We funded them \$2,000.

Citlalli: We didn't fully fund them because there was hesitation around that fact that it would only impact the students going to do that work.

Ayo: Earth Week Interns asked for \$4,000. We also didn't fully fund them because they have a lot of access under the chancellor's office and access to their budgets. MALCS de UCSC asked for \$525.

Aakriti: They were workshops focused on creating a safe space for women of color and self-care.

Ayo: UCSC IEE. What does that stand for?

Citlalli: It's a lab that lets people work on experiments they have 20% over[?].

Ayo: So we funded them \$500. Camp Kesem at UC Santa Cruz.

Zach: This was the camp for kids whose parents are experiencing cancer.

Ayo: We funded them \$1,000. Acquire A Capella asked for \$2160, Since they usually bring awards back to Santa Cruz we funded them \$700. Sigma Zeta AEPi asked for \$800 and we didn't fund them, mainly because they didn't show up. When you go back to student ISA, they also didn't show up but they also messaged Zach in advance. The only issue we're having with ISA is that we don't know how much to fund them so we haven't allocated the money yet. Right now we have \$1,498.22..

Venkatesh: I remember there was \$1,700 left?

Ayo: Oh ya \$1,700. Wait no because there was a motion to fund.

Venkatesh: No that was...

Citlalli: The motion was to fund ISA, but then you said no. So the motion was cancelled I guess?

Zach: May I clarify a few things. We're telling y'all about this now so you can take it back to your spaces. I'm going to update the minutes as soon as I can. This is to vote to approve or vote to change and approve next week. Slugbotics is to make a marine bot for a competition. The ISA that was the no show there was two. The no-show is the one that just presented. Additionally, Sigma Zeta AEPi did email me as well, they just didn't email me before the start of the meeting. ISA emailed me at noon that day. With the active minds for the backpacks--- is that it didn't fail last year, they just didn't *have* it last year. That being said, I will be taking questions about SOFA.

Ayo: We're not done yet.

Zach: There was an organization, Platypus Affiliated Society that we in SOFA decided to bring back in here. Cause we had different opinions in the SOFA meeting.

Venkatesh: [?] I think it's better to have the conversation here.

Ayo: I'm gonna summarize the conversation.

Zach: Platypus is asking for \$300 to print their platypus review. They have chapters around the world. They review publication and print fliers. Generally they're an organization that examines literature (left). Basically it's a printed issues, like a newspaper that analyzes politically left literature. There was mixed viewpoints on SOFA. Some people felt we weren't being inclusive if we were supporting overtly political organization. Others felt as though SUA is a political organization.

Tommy: I don't agree with that. Not funding them. I feel like if we got a right wing thing there would be outrage.

Ayo: Technically, according to the SUA Constitution, section E, article 1--nondiscrimination and it says specifically what we could not discriminate on. Political views is not one of them. If we don't agree with them as SUA we could decide not to fund them. One of the arguments is that it's free speech and that we should give them the ability to talk. I do agree that if it were a different party it would have a different response I think.

Venkatesh: Technically there's nothing in the bylaws and Constitution about not being able to politically discriminate. The second we give SUA the [?] of biasing itself, that gives power to all the other things we are trying to avoid. I feel like us funding an org that is primed to specifically only present one viewpoint is extremely biased and we are sponsoring them and we are the student government. I think that's inherently not allowed because you're not letting certain ideas spread just because of what you believe in. I feel like that could create a lot of oppression in the future and I want to stop that now. I think we should be representative of the student viewpoint. I think spreading one viewpoint is doing that.

Natasha: Does the stack renew every new item?

Zach: It does.

Natasha: I think that there are certain things that SUA should and shouldn't do. I think that funding a right or left wing is not a problem. First of, there has to be enough Republicans on the campus. They would have to create a pamphlet and have the guts to come to SUA for funding.. I think limited government is an issue we don't want to spread here. I think the issue is hate speech that often Republicans often do. I think we're allowed to make certain allowances in that sense. We funded groups like [?] That take artwork from refugees. It's very clear that we have a bias, so I don't see why we shouldn't fully fund just \$300 for Platypus.

Zolt: I totally agree that this body has funded with intent before. I don't think that this is a [?] thing to fund. I think the real problem is that there are concerns about funding different viewpoints. Like a speaker said we would be funding one viewpoint. Let's keep in mind that one part of the political spectrum does not mean that we are only funding one part that's up to the student org. I also I find it extremely problematic that this body would be opposed to a republican group. I find it very very concerning for people to use this body as a way to prevent political discourse. To embrace one side and reject the other is [?]. I'm just saying that I think we should support this funding requests and if another libertarian group comes up and isn't spreading hate speech, why shouldn't we be funding them as well.

Zach: We are out of time on this agenda item.

Cameron: Point of information: we're not modifying it this week, that happens next week right? There's no way you can motion to change it this week?

Zach: We would need to make a motion.

Tommy: Motion to close stack 10:46 pm.

Enrique: Second 10:46 pm.

Zach: No objections. Stack is closed.

Tommy: Motion to extend time by five minutes 10:46 pm.

Venkatesh: Point of information: We no longer have quorum.

Zolt: Second 10:46 pm.

David: Objection. It's so cold and it's so late, we can do this next week 10:47 pm.

Yanathan: Point of inquiry: What are we extending time for?

Zach: 18 opposed to extending time 10:47 pm.

Bella: How do y'all feel? This is just an update on the pantry and what's been going on with admin. If y'all are feeling not so well right now we can probably move it to next week. I don't know if we have time for next week.

Lauren: Could we table it?

Bella: Ya if you do have questions, it's really important that we discuss it very near. I can do it in five. I just want to make sure that we make time for it.

Lauren: I reserve my right to make a motion. The SAS item requires quorum and I'm afraid that we're going to lose quorum. Can we move that up in the agenda. I motion to move the SAS line item up to now 10:49 pm.

Emma: Second 10:49 pm.

Zach: If you go on the agenda we are debating and hopefully voting on now.

Lauren: SAS is student academic senate. Under the SUA as a whole. We presented last week in hopes of getting a line item of 1500. And 500 from general programming. Historically my office has funded them and I can no longer support that amount. I sent all big five plus a couple of other organizations a very long email and got no feedback from them. I got texts from BSU members and they sounded like they were cool with it. I really hope y'all fund this. These are just recommendations (where to fund from).

Celai: Motion to do to \$1000 from spring SOFA and \$500 from general programming to put towards SAS Line item 10:52 pm.

Anna: Second 10:52 pm.

Ayo: I don't want SOFA funds to be moved because that's specifically for organizing. I think it'd be better to just take 1500 from programming.

Venkatesh: SOFA does have a few more things to fund. Also how much funds are left in SUA programming for this year?

Ryan: In the presentation it looked like there was still \$17,000 left in winter SOFA.

Venkatesh: There are still some items to consider that's why there's that much left.

Zach: To clarify —Lauren had originally proposed funding from spring SOFA. Ayo said we don't wanna take money from the orgs. Ryan had mentioned that a thousand maybe we can take from this quarter and Venkatesh said there's still stuff from this quarter to take into consideration.

Cameron: All the stuff that SAS is doing is mostly mental health related?

Lauren: We are working in collaboration with Pause for pause and we are working with academic stress and how to de-stigmatize issues.

Ayo: We have about \$19,000 left in programming.

Zach: Is that taking away all the stuff we've done so far?

Ryan: point of inquiry: we funded the presenter that came in, did we fund from general or SOFA?

Cameron: It was \$700 from SOFA.

Emma: It was \$200 from SOFA and \$500 from programming.

Lauren: Motion for two minute recess 10:58 pm.

Venkatesh: Second 10:58 pm.

Meeting resumed 11:02 pm.

Zach: We have four more minutes on this agenda item.

Ayo: We are at \$14,945.32 for the rest of the year. We also have \$3,800 in student organizing travel.

Ryan: Point of inquiry, how much did we start with?

Cameron: Can I motion to completely fund Lauren's line item the same one Celai said 11:04 pm.

Tommy: Second 11:04 pm.

Ayo: There is an SAS line item.

Lauren: The SUA line item is titled Student Academic Affairs/SAS. And I'm asking to separate that name and then create a new line item for SAS.

Zach: Ayo was that an objection?

Ayo: No.

Zach: We are no longer considering the amount from spring sofa.

Zolt: How far above quorum are we?

Zach: One person can leave. Are there any objections. No objections.

11:07PM: Closing Remarks and Adjournment

Zach: what would happen is that we would go into sua pantry and basic needs, CORE council, charter ratification.

Citlalli: Can I do a friendly amendment to table all leftover agenda items and then adjournment 11:08 pm.
